Lions' tail Leonotis nepetifolia

Lion's tail is declared a Class B (growth and spread to be controlled) and Class C (not to be introduced) weed in the Northern Territory

Lion's tail is a declared weed in accordance with the Weed Management Act.



Usually found in disturbed areas, roadsides, overgrazed sites and levee banks of rivers.



An erect annual herb to 3m tall, sparsely branched and covered in short white hairs. Stems are square with a distinct groove along each side.



Leaves are opposite with serrated edges, and are quite large when young.



Orange pom-pom flowers form in clusters, 5 - 6cm in diameter and held within small sharp leaves (bracts).



Seeds are triangular, velvety and hairy, and are produced in large quantities.
